THE RABBI TEACHES

As I write this article, the Torah portion for the week just happens to be *Vayishlach*, the portion where Jacob prepares to meet his twin brother Esau after years of separation. Back when they were younger, Jacob had tricked Esau out of the family birthright and their father's dying blessing, and Jacob

left home right afterwards, when Esau threatened to kill him in a fit of anger.

In the years that have passed, both brothers have established lives for themselves. The night before the brothers are to meet again, Jacob sends his family ahead, and he is left alone. Torah tells us that during the night Jacob wrestles with an *ish*, an unnamed figure (possibly human, possibly divine), and at the end of their wrestling match, that mysterious figure blesses Jacob and changes his name to *Yisrael* (Israel), which means: "One who wrestles with God."

As *B'nai Yisrael* (the Children of Israel), we, ourselves, inherit that name. This is a sacred reminder that Judaism is not about easy answers or finding certainty, but about wrestling with our questions and our faith (at times), striving to understand what God wants (or requires) of us, seeking and searching to find meaning and holiness in our lives, wrestling with doubts, and striving to figure out how we can each bring more goodness and godliness into our world.

As $B'nai\ Yisrael$ we are taught to appreciate complexity and nuance, and to never stop learning.

This winter, we will be hosting an important lecture series on The History of the Modern State of Israel and The Arab-Israeli Conflict: From Its Origins to the Present. This 5-session series will run on Sunday mornings (January 12, January 26, February 9, February 23, March 2), from 9:30-11:00 am, on Zoom only.

Our featured lecturer will be Dr. David Mendelsson, educator, historian, author, and senior lecturer in Israel Studies and Modern Jewish History at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Jerusalem and senior lecturer at Hebrew University's Rothberg International School. Dr. Mendelsson has also served as Scholar-in-Residence at universities throughout the United States.

This series is free for Kol Ami members (\$50 for non-members). Registration through our website (www.kolaminj.org) is required to receive the Zoom link.

First Session: Zionism: Ideology and Historical Context (January 12)

This class will examine the emergence of Zionism in the 19th century amidst an historical context of antisemitism, the crisis of Judaism in the modern period, and the historic relationship of Jews to the Land of Israel. The class will address the claims regarding Zionism as a form of colonialism.

Second Session: From Zionist Idea to Jewish Statehood (January 26)

This class will study the political developments concerning Palestine/ Israel from the collapse of the Ottoman Empire at the end of the First World War until the United Nations General Assembly vote on the partition of Palestine in 1947. It will discuss the emergence of the Arab -Israel conflict and discuss the relationship of the Holocaust to the creation of the state.

Third Session: 1948-1973 (February 9)

In this class we will discuss Israel's War of Independence and the emergence of the Palestinian refugee problem. We will examine the causes and outcomes of the 1967 war that led to Israel's capture of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, the Golan Heights, the Gaza strip and the Sinai desert. We shall also discuss the major issues surrounding the Yom Kippur War and its aftermath.

Fourth Session: Peace and War (February 23)


We will look at the Egypt-Israel peace treaty, discuss the first Lebanon War and explain the factors that led to further efforts at peace making, particularly the Oslo process. The ensuing Second Intifada will also be discussed.

Fifth Session: The Tunnel Vision of Military Campaigns and War (March 2)

The final class will look at Israel's confrontations with Hezballah in the north and Hamas in the south. What is the wider context in which these confrontations take place? Is there any reason for optimism?

I hope you will join us for this series. As a student of Dr. Mendelsson's during my time studying in Israel, I look forward to the opportunity for all of us at Kol Ami to learn from him and engage in, and wrestle with, these complex issues and questions. Each session will leave time for a question and answer period with Dr. Mendelsson.










EARLY CHILDHOOD Laura Hoffman
